- 4) Community Development, Experience Centre and Camping: Led by Councillors Diane Cyr and Steve Thériault.



ACCESS TO BOAT RAMP

The boat ramp on the Campbellton RV campground site is accessible to all during the summer.

Access on foot is permitted at all times. For vehicle access, you must obtain a gate access card. Access with a card is permitted from May 1 to October 31 from 5 a.m. to 11 p.m.



Passes are available at the reception desk at City Hall (76 Water Street) from 9:30 a.m. to 11:30 a.m. and 12:30 p.m. to 3 p.m., or at the Restigouche River Experience Centre (1 Riverview Drive) starting May 18 between 8 a.m. and 8 p.m. daily. A \$10 deposit is required along with a photocopy of your driver's licence and vehicle registration.



ANIMAL CONTROL

Friendly reminder: Please ensure your pet is on a leash and not left unsupervised on the streets of the Campbellton Regional Community. Dogs must have a valid dog licence which can be obtained at City Hall.

 ATHOLVILLE, CAMPBELLTON, SAINT-ARTHUR AND VAL D'AMOURS AREAS:

A 50% discount is available if you register and license the animal before **March 31**. After this date, the fee will be \$20.

TIDE HEAD AREA:

The fee for spayed and neutered dogs is \$10. The fee for intact dogs is \$15. Dogs must be registered by **April 30** annually. A \$10 penalty will be added to the fee for anyone not obtaining their licence by this date.


No owner shall permit or condone the defecation of their pet on any property in the municipality that is not his or her own. The owner shall immediately remove any fecal matter left by the pet on property that is not the pet owner's property.

FIRE SAFETY





With the arrival of spring and the melting of snow comes the time to clean up dead grass and leaves. Some believe that the best and easiest way is to burn them. There is an old myth that burned grass grows back faster, but this is not true. When you burn grass or brush, it is dangerous for you and your neighbours.

In addition, Fire Department resources are mobilized to manage grass fires instead of being available to deal with other pressing emergencies.

Think before you light that small patch of grass. You could burn someone's fence or worse, your house.

Outdoor fire pits

Outdoor fire season is here! To ensure that everyone can enjoy a safe fire this summer, make sure you have a safe fire pit in a safe place, and check it frequently.

Tips:


- Your firepit must be CSA approved or approved by the local fire department.
- The firepit must have a spark arrestor.
- Never burn plastic, construction debris, treated lumber. These items contain toxins and can be harmful to people or pets.
- You must maintain proper distance from buildings, fences, etc.
- Keep a garden hose or portable extinguisher on hand in case the fire gets out of your control.
- Keep children and pets away form the fire pit.
- Never leave your fire unattended, even for a short period of time.
- Residents are reminded that they can't cause undue harm to your neighbors.

 People with respiratory problems or allergies can be affected by the smoke from your firepit.
- Always check with authorities if burning is allowed according to the Forest Fire Watch.

Barbecue

- Make sure your barbecue has been cleaned after being stored for the winter.
- If using charcoal, only use the appropriate lighter fluid to start your barbecue and never add additional fluid after igniting.
- When using a propane device, before lighting check for leaks by using a
 mixture of soap and water, if bubbles form at any connection, tighten all
 the connections and repeat.
- Never ignite with a match or cigarette lighter.
- Keep your propane tank in an upright position at all times.
- Keep all grills away from combustibles when cooking.

FLUSHING PROGRAM

Please be advised that the Campbellton Regional Community Water Department will carry out water main flushing on its water system in the Atholville area starting **Friday**, **May 12**, until **Friday**, **June 2**, inclusive, in order to continue providing quality water. During this time, residents may

experience reduced water pressure and some water discoloration. Residents are advised to run their water and check it before laundering. The Campbellton Regional Community apologizes for any inconvenience caused to its residents during this period.



DESIGNATED DISABLED PARKING



Campbellton Regional Community residents and visitors are reminded that designated disabled parking spaces in the municipality are for those holding valid disabled parking permits ONLY.

These special permits are issued in situations where the person has a significant degree of mobility impairment caused by paralysis, lower limb amputation, heart or lung d isease or other health problems such that

the person would have difficulty walking unassisted more than 50 metres in outdoor weather conditions.

We are asking for the public's cooperation in ensuring that these parking spaces be kept available for those who need them.

Vehicles not displaying a valid disabled parking permit risk being towed or fined.
